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LENT NIGHT

February 7th at 5:45pm

This parish has a local tradition of gathering on a Wednesday night before Lent to experience prayer, a meal, and a community building activity. Lent Night this year is Wednesday Feb. 7th, starting at 5:45pm in the church. Mark your calendar. This is NOT a youth activity, even though the participants of Religious Formation are expected to be present with their families. This night is for every member of the parish. In order to prepare sufficient sustenance and materials, please sign up on the tables in the Gathering Area. I think you will enjoy it.

Stations of the Cross

Stations of the Cross will be prayed at 6:30pm every Friday of Lent except Good Friday. The Stations commemorate the stops along the Via Dolorosa (Latin for Way of Sorrow), Jesus' journey of about a mile from Pilate's court to Calvary. Mary, the mother of Jesus, is believed to have often retraced the sorrowful way her Son made on Good Friday.

The Manner of Fulfilling the Precept of Penance:

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of fast and abstinence.

All Fridays in Lent are days of abstinence only. The Law of Abstinence (not eating meat) obliges those who have completed their 14th year.

The law of fast (only one full meal each day, nothing between meals) obliges those who have completed their 18th year until the beginning of their 60th year.

Definitions:

Fasting: Limitations on food and

Abstaining: Refraining from meat on Fridays of Lent.

Q. I understand that all the Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence from meat, but I'm not sure what is classified as meat. Does meat include chicken and dairy products?

A. Abstinence laws consider that meat comes only from animals such as chickens, cows, sheep or pigs --- all of which live on land. Birds are also considered meat. Abstinence does not include meat juices and liquid foods made from meat. Thus, such foods as chicken broth, soups cooked or flavored with meat, meat gravies or sauces, as well as seasonings or condiments made from animal fat are technically not forbidden. However, moral theologians have traditionally taught that we should abstain from all animal-derived products (except foods such as gelatin, butter, cheese and eggs, which do not have any meat taste). Fish are a different category of animal. (USCCB web site)

Centering Prayer

7:10am every Wednesday of Lent, except Ash Wednesday in the Church

Contemplative prayer or centering prayer, silent prayer, breathing prayer, listening prayer, is defined as listening to God by repeating a word or phrase usually from the Bible (a mantra) and achieving silence in the mind, body and spirit. It also involves using breathing exercises to slow down your breath and empty your mind of any distractions and thoughts.

It emphasizes prayer as a personal relationship with God. At the same time, it is a discipline to foster and serve this relationship by a regular, daily practice of prayer. It is Christ-centered in its focus, building faith.

Catholics Encounter Christ



Catholics Encounter Christ is offering a weekend experience for men and women to help them grow in their faith and revitalize their spiritual life. The CEC experience is a structured 3-day weekend beginning on Friday evening concluding on Sunday evening at Camp Comeca south of Cozad. What should you expect during the three days? Twenty to thirty men or women meet with a team of priests and lay people. There are discussions, singing, joking, laughter, and spontaneous informal prayer. Discussions are centered on talks emphasizing the true meaning of grace, the sacraments, the Mass, the nature and need of prayer, living



Definition of The Events of Lent and Holy Week

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LENT: is an Anglo-Saxon word meaning *spring*. The season lasts from Ash Wednesday until the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday.

ASH WEDNESDAY: marks the beginning of Lent, often observed by receiving a cross of ashes on the forehead at Mass.

HOLY WEEK: includes the days from Palm Sunday through Easter.

<u>PALM or PASSION SUNDAY</u>: has contrasting names, one because of Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem (to the waving palm branches), the other because this Sunday begins our focus on Jesus' days of suffering and death.

PASCHAL TRIDUUM: from the Latin for "three days," extends from evening Holy Thursday through Easter Sunday.

MAUNDY (HOLY) THURSDAY: gets its name from Jesus' "new commandment" to love one another, which he spoke during the Passover meal when he washed his disciples' feet and instituted the Holy Eucharist. Typically the Catholic Church now refers to this day as Holy Thursday and it is also notable for being the day on which the Chrism Mass is celebrated.

GOOD FRIDAY: marks the events of Jesus' trial, crucifixion, death and burial, sometimes with special three hour observances. The altar is stripped of all decoration and the church darkened until Saturday's Easter Vigil.

EASTER VIGIL: is celebrated on Holy Saturday evening after sundown; traditionally a time for baptizing, confirming and receiving new members.

EASTER: named after an ancient spring festival, is the "great Sunday," on which each Sunday Eucharist is modeled. The Resurrection of our Lord.



Fasting – THIS YEAR, LET'S NOT GIVE UP SOMETHING, LETS TAKE UP SOMETHING TO GROW OUR FAITH!! Fast from things of THIS MODERN WORLD and focus on how to become a better Catholic and be stronger in our faith. It is not so much what you "Give up" as much as it is what you "Take Up." Almsgiving – BE aware of the poor. Live on less and give the difference to others in need. Skip a lunch and give that money to the poor.

Nurses Corner

No one can avoid winter weather, but with these tips, you can avoid complications of winter travel.

When planning travel, be aware of current and forecast weather conditions.

Avoid traveling when the weather service has issued advisories.

If you must travel, inform a friend or relative of your proposed route and expected time of arrival. Follow these safety rules if you become stranded in your car.

Stay with your car unless safety is no more than 100 yards away, but continue to move arms and legs.

Stay visible by putting bright cloth on the antenna, turning on the inside overhead light (when engine is running), and raising the hood when snow stops falling.

Run the engine and heater only 10 minutes every hour.

Keep a downwind window open.

Make sure the tailpipe is not blocked.

Above all, be ready to check on family and neighbors who are especially at risk from cold weather hazards: young children, older adults, and the chronically ill. If you have pets, bring them inside. If you cannot bring them inside, provide adequate, warm shelter and unfrozen water to drink.

Parish Registration



Are you registered at St. Leo's? For Baptisms, Sponsor letters, Weddings, and Funerals, belonging to a parish is the first requirement. People are sometimes surprised when they move to another city and want to have a Baptism or Wedding in a parish, but are not allowed to because they do not belong to that parish. Most all Catholic ministry is based on the parish to which you belong. Most dioceses follow the basic law of the church about parish boundaries, so you belong to the parish that you live in. Whatever parish you choose, it's important to make a commitment to that parish, and be actively involved. We are happy to give permission for Baptism at another parish or to do Baptisms for family members from another parish, but a letter of permission from the proper Pastor is needed. Please make sure you are registered at your parish. Please contact the Office at 308-382-4753 to register at St. Leo's.
